hat with Grant, AA1T, pulling up stakes and headed for the Nutmeg state and David, N1ESK, consumed with work at the glow factory (his satellite articles will resume at some point) it's going to be more difficult to fill up each monthly issue of the Digital Digest.

Nevertheless we will prevail. Each month you'll find a web site of interest to Hams. For this site and all future ones discussed let's make it clear that I do not own stock in any of them. Nor do I gain any profits from merchandise you might acquire from them.

This particular company deals mainly with emergency communications, batteries, chargers, etc. Their real claim to fame, though, is that they are the makers of that famous and innovative connector, the Anderson Power Pole. Come out to Field Day this month and you'll see them in abundant use.

Why are they great? Let's say a rig dies and you need to borrow a fellow Ham's piece of equipment. You discover, though, that his power connector has fittings that don't match your battery. If you both had Rig Runners (we'll cover their site next month) the problem would not exist. Anything needing power can be easily

inter-changed with anything else, provided that that their power leads are power pole equipped.

They're relatively easy to assemble either by crimping or soldering and the construction is such that it's impossible to get the plus and minus leads hooked up incorrectly – not that any of us have ever done that little stunt.

So, check out their offerings. Perhaps you'll be motivated to equip all your portable gear with Anderson Power Poles. If I didn't mention it, they won't cost you an arm and a leg.

I'm always interested in feedback or questions concerning these sites. If I don't know an answer (highly probable) we'll steer you towards one.


