FCC Rule Book

§97.1 Basis and purpose

- a) Recognition and enhancement of the value of the amateur service to the public as a voluntary *non-commercial communication service*, particularly with respect to providing emergency communications. \$97.113 Prohibited transmissions.
- (5) Communications, on a regular basis, which could reasonably be furnished alternatively through other radio services.

We all wanted to provide that communication and show what amateur radio could do, but the rules stated very clearly, we had to say no. We all wanted to find out ways we could justify operating, but it was clear we had to sit this one out. This brings up a good point though; think before you volunteer your services. We had said we could do this, even going up and scouting locations for operators, but we had to turn around and say no after the fact. THE LEAGUE AND US

he WRRC is affiliated with the American Radio Relay League. In order to maintain this affiliation 50% of our members must



belong to the ARRL. So far this has not been a problem

and we thank the League members for your extra support.

What does this mean for us?

Referrals of prospective Hams in our area

- Mailing labels for particular zip codes. This is what we use every year to mail all the Hams in Windham County who are not members of the WRRC.
- Reduced prices on library sets that we might want to donate to local libraries
- Club commission recruitment program

From a financial standpoint it's that last item that helps us the most. Whenever a WRRC member renews their ARRL membership we get a \$2 rebate. Our membership consists of 47 "full: members (those who are licensed Hams) and 6 Associate members. Pause now while I take my shoes off.

Out of the 47 full members 26 belong to the League so our percentage rate is 55.3%. For each League member that renews their ARRL membership via the club we get a \$2 kick back. Now \$2 doesn't' sound like much it means \$52 extra each year in the kitty.

If you're not a League member and decide to join via the WRRC we will get a \$15 kick back.

I therefore urge you NOT to send that renewal notice and check directly to Newington. Instead, send it to me. I'll do the necessary paper work and forward a club check to the League for \$2 less than you sent me. Thanks for helping make us rich.

Below is the information that I include in every mailing of the minutes.

HELP MAKE US RICH

As an ARRL affiliated club we can, with your cooperation, earn money for the WRRC.

If you are renewing your League membership we get a \$2 kickback.

If you join the League as a new member we get a \$15 kickback.

Here's how it's done – Mail your renewal or new member check to me, **NOT** the ARRL. Make your check out to the WRRC, **NOT** the League.

I will deposit your check in our WRRC account and write a check to the League for \$2 or \$15 less than the full amount, depending on whether you are renewing a membership or coming in as a new member. This check, accompanied with the appropriate form to insure that your membership or renewal is properly credited, will be mailed onto the League by me.
