Fun Facts – Where are all the Hams in Vermont?

hile surfing the net the other night, I came across a website that I have seen and used many of times. It was the ARRL Website <a href="www.arrl.org">www.arrl.org</a>. From there I was looking around at the redesigned site and things seem to make sense now that the formatting is much better than what it was years ago. Remember when the search engine did not work, the layout was nasty and well, it was hard to navigate. Now, I have been to the site for specific things by doing a Google search and it took me to where I needed to be. Sometimes that is the easy way around the world of the wacky web. But today, it is a destination for your amateur radio information.

While visiting the ARRL site, I became interested in looking at the statistics of the VE Session section. I wanted to see how many VE sessions that I have assisted in over the past years. That number is 14 sessions, if you are interested. Then I thought that it has been years since I did a "review of the state" licensed and active amateur radio operators. So here is the compiled list of things I found that you really do not need to know, but what the heck, you can read it anyway!

Here in the United States of America, there are currently 758,946 active licensed amateur radio operators spreading his/her signal around the world. The number of licensed operator per class breakdown is:

Novice Class – 15,768 Technician Class – 371,007 Technician + Class – 1 General Class – 168,301 Advanced Class – 58,663 Amateur Extra Class – 133,413 Club Calls – 11,748

In the State of Vermont, there are 2,305 Active Licensed Amateur Radio calls with a Vermont address. This represents about 0.304% of all amateur radio license holders in the United States of America reside in Ver-



mont. The number of licensed operator per class breakdown is:

Novice Class – 36 Technician Class – 1055 Technician + Class – 0 General Class – 534 Advanced Class – 175 Amateur Extra Class – 443 Club Calls – 62

Of these 2,305 licensed amateur operators within the State of Vermont, there are 110 licensed operators in Windham County.

On the Vermont Emergency Communications side of this wonderful hobby, the Vermont Emergency Management RACES program has a total of 209 members enlisted volunteering their time and equipment when the need is there. There are also 203 ARES members in Vermont. Now many of the ARES members also belong to VEM RACES so these mostly are the same people as dual membership is always suggested in RACES and VT ARES. In Windham County we have 17 RACES/ARES WRRC members maintaining emergency communications within the area.

Another interesting bit of information to pass along is that Vermont has 137 Volunteer Examiners! The West River Radio Club has 8 Volunteer Examiners in our team ready to administer any licensing exam you require.

Now for the West River Radio Club information compiled for the knowledge of all, we currently have 35 Full members of which 27 of our members belong to ARRL giving us a 76% membership ratio for our ARRL Club Affiliation. We also have 4 Auxiliary members helping us keep the ship upright.

Our checking account has \$2,278.75 in it as of 10/31/2012. No deposits have been made since.

So with this little bit of information that I have passed along to you for your knowledge, I know you will remember it as there will be a final exam! In closing, we hope you have a wonderful and safe holiday season and we are looking forward to a brighter 2013! Thanks for all of your help and support to WRRC and the ever enhancing art of amateur radio and emergency communications!

VIRGINIA O'HANLON.

115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH STREET."

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except [what] they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.
