- Serve as a go-between with the FCC and Congress to fight for what's good for our hobby
- Sponsor a VE program
- Represent US Hams at IARU and ITU meetings
- Operate under a representative form of government with elected representatives to the ARRL governing board. Our District 1 Rep is Tom Frenaye K1KI
- Sponsor numerous contests and operating events, one being Field Day. Ham Radio's most popular event.
- Offer many awards for operating accomplishments
- Organize and sponsor many educational programs for youth and adults
- Nearly all of the ARRL chores get done by volunteers
- Maintain a lab where rigs and accessories are thoroughly tested and reported on honestly



MAN RETURNS TO FIND ENTIRE SHACK SOLD AT SK SALE
